MANUFACTURING AND PACKAGING (A1-A3)

The environmental impacts considered for the product stage cover the manufacturing of raw materials used in the production as well as packaging materials and other ancillary materials. Also, fuels used by machines, and handling of waste formed in the production processes at the manufacturing facilities are included in this stage. The study also considers the material losses occurring during the manufacturing processes as well as losses during electricity transmission.

The process of making precast concrete while considering the environmental impacts involves several stages.

Firstly, the manufacturing of materials used in the production is considered. This includes the extraction and processing of raw materials such as sand, gravel, and cement. These materials are then combined to create the concrete mix. The environmental impact of this stage is primarily due to the energy consumption and emissions associated with the extraction and processing of these raw materials and transporting to Solway Precast factory. We know the distances that they were transported and have accounted these in our EPD calculation.

Next, the packaging materials and other ancillary materials used in the production process are taken into account. These materials can include things like moulds for shaping the concrete, as well as packaging materials for transporting the finished product. The environmental impact of this stage is mainly due to the production and disposal of these materials. We recycle all waste to either our Biomass boiler with the timber being used as fuel, the other materials are sent to a local recycler facility.

The fuels used by machines during the production process are also considered. This includes the fuel used by the machinery to mix the concrete, as well as the fuel used by vehicles to transport the raw materials. The environmental impact of this stage is primarily due to the emissions associated with the combustion of these fuels. The handling of waste formed in the production processes at the manufacturing facilities is another important consideration. This includes the disposal of any leftover concrete mix, as well as any waste generated from the cleaning of equipment and machinery. The environmental impact of this stage is mainly due to the disposal of this waste, which can contribute to landfill and pollution. We recycle any waste rebar to a local recycler for further use, aggregates and

concrete waste generated on site is crushed for further internal use.

The study also considers the material losses occurring during the manufacturing processes. This can include any concrete mix that is wasted due to overproduction or errors during the production process. The environmental impact of this stage is primarily due to the wasted resources and energy. By considering all these factors, the process of making precast concrete can be optimized to minimize its environmental impact. This can contribute to the sustainability of the construction industry and help to protect our environment for future generations.

TRANSPORT AND INSTALLATION (A4-A5)

Transportation impacts occurred from final products delivery to construction site (A4) cover fuel direct exhaust emissions, environmental impacts of fuel production, as well as related infrastructure emissions.

This EPD does not cover the transportation in A4 to the clients site due the the many sites within the UK area we deliver to. Solway Precast dont offer the installation stage in A5 and have not accounted for these emmissions. Air, soil, and water impacts during the transport and installation phases have not been studied within this EPD.

PRODUCT USE AND MAINTENANCE (B1-B7)

This EPD does not cover the use phase. Air, soil, and water impacts during the use phase have not been studied.

This project assumed 100 years of RSL, as per SFS-EN 16757:2017.

PRODUCT END OF LIFE (C1-C4, D)

At the end-of-life, in the demolition phase 100% of the waste is assumed to be collected as separate construction waste. The demolition process consumes energy in the form of diesel fuel used by building machines. Energy

consumption of a demolition process is on the average 10 kWh/m² (Bozdağ, Ö & Seğer, M. 2007). Basing on a Level(s) project, an average mass of a reinforced concrete building is about 1000 kg/m². Therefore, energy consumption demolition is assumed to be 10 kWh/1000 kg = 0,01 kWh/kg. The source of energy is diesel fuel used by work machines (C1).

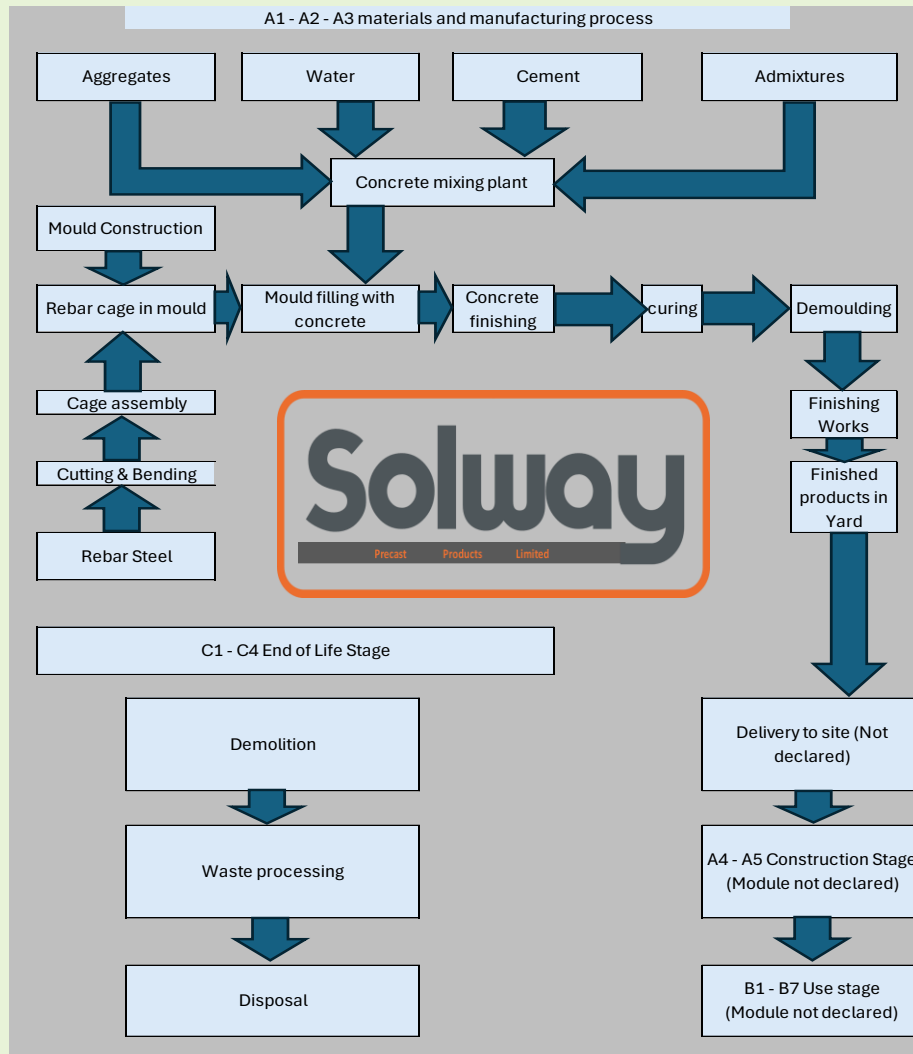
The demolished concrete pieces are delivered to the nearest construction waste treatment plant. It is estimated that there is no mass loss during the use of the product, therefore the end-of-life product is assumed that it has the same weight with the declared product. Transportation distance to the closest disposal area is estimated as 50 km and the transportation method is lorry which is the most common (C2).

At the waste treatment plant, waste that can be reused, recycled or recovered for energy is separated and diverted for further use. It can be assumed that 100% of the concrete products are transported to a waste treatment plant, where the products are crushed and separated. About 93.6% of the reinforced concrete is recycled (Eurostat 2016). The process losses of the waste treatment plant are assumed to be negligible (C3). The remaining 6.4% of concrete and steel are assumed to be sent to the landfill (C4).

Due to the recycling potential of the concrete, it can be used as secondary raw material, which avoids the use of virgin raw materials. The 93.6% of concrete going to waste processing is converted into secondary raw materials after recycling. The recycled material content in the concrete is assumed to be 0% (D).



MANUFACTURING PROCESS



At Solway Precast we are committed to low carbon vehicles to get our employees to our workplace. CUT-OFF CRITERIA

The study does not exclude any modules or processes which are stated mandatory in the reference standard and the applied PCR. The study does not exclude any hazardous materials or substances. The study includes all major raw material and energy consumption. All inputs and outputs of the unit processes, for which data is available for, are included in the calculation. There is no neglected unit process more than 1% of total mass or energy flows. The module specific total neglected input and output flows also do not exceed 5% of energy usage or mass.

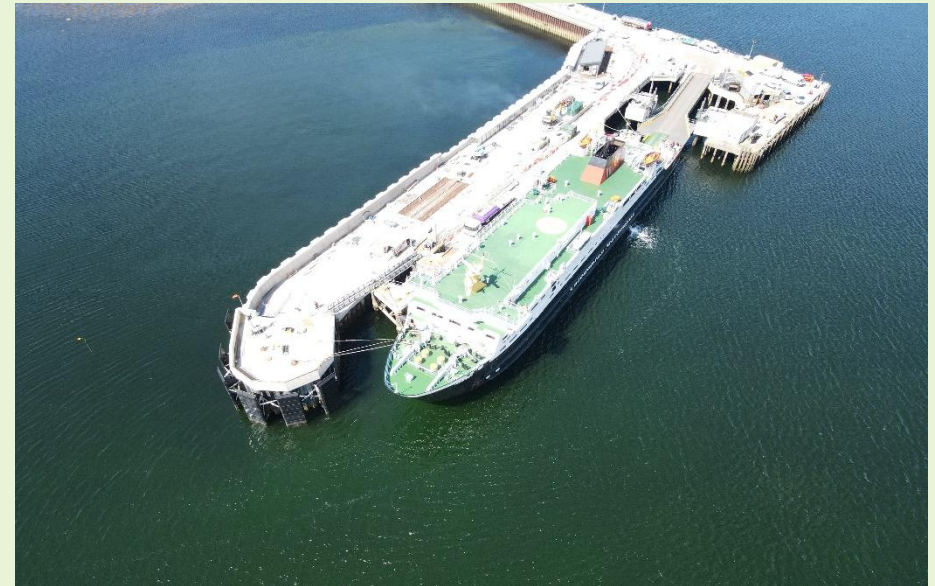
